- We are using environment friendly Surface Miner machine which having inbuilt water spray system during excavation thus there is no noise & dust emission. Thus there are no impact of noise and vibration as we are not doing any drilling and blasting activity. On all haul roads regular water sprinkling is being done by water tankers. All transportation vehicles are equipped with multi cap to transport material in covered condition. Presently due to the our rain water harvesting in mined out pits the salinity of the ground water has been effectively reduced and now the neighboring farmers are using ground water for watering their crops. They are taking three crops in a year where earlier there was only single crop farming in practice.
- d) Broad leaved tree sapling of not less than 10 feet height and maintenance of the same shall be carried.
- We deploy dedicated team to monitor, watering, caring and nurturing of planted sapling.
- Saplings of 8 to 10 feet height were planted Peepal (Ficus religiosa) Banyan Tree (Ficus benghalensis), Badam (Terminalia catappa) etc. However availability of broad leave tree sapling is a challenge, we are continuously engaging with nurseries to find out the sources.
- Also we are facing problem in maintenance of high rise saplings due to their vulnerability to wind speed and heavy rains

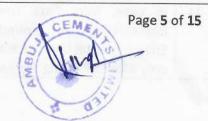


The Project Proponent shall inform the MoEF&CC for any change in ownership of the mining lease. In case there is any change in ownership or mining lease is transferred than mining operation shall only be carried out after transfer of EC as per provisions of the para 11 of EIA Notification, 2006 as amended from time to time.

There is no change in owner ship of mining lease.

#### II. Air Quality Monitoring and Preservation

- The Project Proponent shall install a minimum of 9 3 (three) online Ambient Air Quality Monitoring Stations with 1 (one) in upwind and 2 (two) in downwind direction based on long term climatological data about wind direction such that an angle of 120° is made between the monitoring locations to monitor parameters, relevant for mining operations, of air pollution viz. PM10, PM2.5, N02, CO and SO2 etc. as per the methodology mentioned in NAAQS Notification No. B-29016/20/90/PCI/1, dated 18.11.2009 covering the aspects of transportation and use of heavy machinery in the impact zone. The ambient air quality shall also be monitored at prominent places like
- Three continuous ambient air quality monitoring stations are installed in the core zone (two) and buffer zone(one) of mine lease area. Various parameters such as PM10, PM2.5, SOx, NOx & CO are being monitored as per guidelines.
- The data is also been displayed using electronic display board in public domain.
- Ambient air quality monitoring results for the period October'2022 to March'2023 is enclosed at point no. (II)10



office building, canteen etc. as per the site condition to ascertain the exposure characteristics at specific places. The above data shall be digitally displayed within 03 months in front of the main Gate of the mine site.

- 10 Effective safeguard measures for prevention of dust generation and subsequent suppression (like regular water sprinkling, mettled road construction etc.) shall be carried out in areas prone to air pollution wherein high levels of PM10 and PM2.5 are evident such as haul road, loading and unloading point and transfer points. The Fugitive dust emissions from all sources shall be regularly controlled by installation of required equipment's / machineries and preventive maintenance. Use of suitable water-soluble chemical dust suppressing agents may be explored for better effectiveness of dust control system. It shall be ensured that air pollution level conform to the standards prescribed by the MoEFCC/ Central Pollution Control Board.
- We have deployed mechanized covered tippers for transportation of limestone. We have deployed dedicated water tankers for water sprinkling on haul road. We have surface miners equipped with water spray system during loading and excavating the limestone.
- Half yearly ambient air quality monitoring report is being regularly submitted to MoEF&CC, our last submission was on 26.05.2022 vide letter no. ACL/EMD/F-16/2022/2522/90455.

#### III. Water quality monitoring and preservation

In case, immediate mining scheme envisages intersection of ground water table, then Environmental Clearance shall become operational only after receiving formal clearance from CGWA.

There is no drilling and blasting in our mining area. We do mining extracting limestone slice by slice using a specialized equipment named Surface Miner. The present model of Surface

In case, mining operation involves intersection of ground water table at a later stage, then PP shall ensure that prior approval from CGWA and MoEFCC is in place before such mining operations. The permission for intersection of ground water table shall essentially be based on detailed hydrogeological study of the area.

- Ground water level & Analysis monitoring is being done regularly by establishing a network of ground water monitoring stations. Report is submitted to MoEF&CC regional office Bhopal, CGWB, CGWA and GPCB on yearly (April'2021 to March'2022) basis. Last submitted on 18.05.2022 vide letter no ACL/EMD/F-9/2022/2503.
- 13 The Project Proponent shall undertake regular monitoring of natural water course/ water resources/ springs and perennial nallahs existing/ flowing in and around the mine lease including upstream and downstream. Sufficient number of gullies shall be provided at appropriate places within the lease for management of water. The parameters to be monitored shall include their water quality vis-a-vis suitability for usage as per CPCB criteria and flow rate. It shall be ensured that no obstruction and/ or alteration be made to water bodies during mining operations justification and prior approval of MoEFCC. The monitoring of water courses/ bodies existing in lease area shall be carried out four times in a year viz. pre- monsoon (April-May), monsoon (August), post-monsoon (November) and winter (January) and the record of monitored data may be sent regularly to Ministry of Environment, Forest and Climate Change and its Regional Office, Central Ground Water Authority and Regional Director, Central Ground Water Board, State Pollution Board and Central Pollution Control Board. Clearly showing the trend analysis on sixmonthly basis.
- We have under taken work of construction of check dams along the Shighoda Rivers for the water management. We also monitoring water quality of the upstream and downstream of the Shinghoda River.
- The Ground water level & Analysis monitoring is being done regularly by establishing a network of ground water monitoring stations. Report is submitted to MoEF&CC regional office Bhopal, CGWB, CGWA and GPCB on yearly (April'2021 to March'2022) basis. Last submitted on 18.05.2022 vide letter no ACL/EMD/F-9/2022/2503.

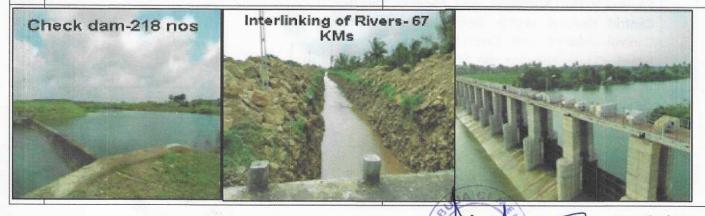

- Quality of polluted water generated from mining operations which include Chemical Oxygen Demand (COD) in mines run-off; acid mine drainage and metal contamination in runoff shall be monitored along with Total Suspended Solids (TDS), Dissolved Oxygen (DO), pH and Total Suspended Solids (TSS). The monitored data shall be uploaded on the website of the company as well as displayed at the project site in public domain, on a display board, at a suitable location near the main gate of the Company. 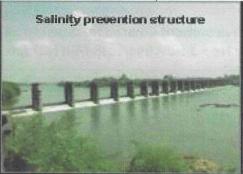
- Project Proponent shall plan, develop and implement rainwater harvesting measures on long term basis to augment ground water resources in the area in consultation with Central Ground Water Board/ State Groundwater Department. A report on amount of water recharged needs to be submitted to Regional Office MoEFCC annually.
- We through our CSR arm Ambuja Cement Foundation have implemented rainwater harvesting measures on long term basis to augment ground water resources in consultation with govt. authorities.

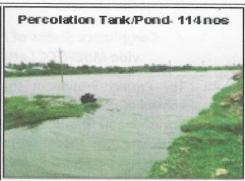


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- Industrial waste water (workshop and waste water from the mine) should be properly collected and treated so as to conform to the notified standards prescribed from time to time. The standards shall be prescribed through Consent to Operate (CTO) issued by concerned State Pollution Control Board (SPCB). The workshop effluent shall be treated after its initial passage through Oil and grease trap.
- No waste water or mine drainage from mining operations.
- The water balance/water auditing shall be carried out and measure for reducing the consumption of water shall be taken up and reported to the Regional Office of the MoEF&CC and State Pollution Control Board/Committee.
- The water consumption is for drinking purpose, green belt development & haul road dust suppression.

#### IV. Noise and vibration monitoring and prevention

- The peak particle velocity at 500m distance or within the nearest habitation, whichever is closer shall be monitored periodically as per applicable DGMS guidelines.
- We are doing mining through eco-friendly surface miners. There are no drilling and blasting activities done. Thus no vibration or noise impact on nearby habitation.
- The illumination and sound at night at project sites disturb the villages in respect of both human and animal population. Consequent sleeping disorders and stress may affect the health in the villages located close to mining operations. Habitations have a right for darkness and minimal noise levels at night. PPs must ensure that the biological clock of the villages is not disturbed; by orienting the floodlights/ masks away from the villagers and keeping the noise levels well within the prescribed limits for day /night hours.
- We are operating our mines during day time only i.e. 06:00 AM to 06:00 PM.
- Mining is done by using eco-friendly surface miners. Tree plantation has been done around the periphery of lease area. The day and night time noise level is very well within the prescribed limit and monitored and reported to GPCB & MoEF&CC regularly.

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- The Project Proponent shall take measures for control of noise levels below 85 dB (A) in the work environment. The workers engaged in operations of HEMM, etc. should be provided with ear plugs /muffs. All personnel including laborers working in dusty areas shall be provided with protective respiratory devices along with adequate training, awareness and information on safety and health aspects. The PP shall be held responsible in case it has been found that workers/ personals/ laborers are working without personal protective equipment.
- Mining is being done by using eco-friendly surface miners. All the HEMM has been provide acoustic cabins for drivers and also has been provided ear plugs to all workers along with other PPEs like safety helmet, safety shoes, safety goggles and reflective iackets.
- All the machines are emitting noise well below 85 dB (A) and have deployed loader from LIEBHERR Germany.

#### VIII Green Belt

The Project Proponent shall develop greenbelt in 7.5m wide safety zone all along the mine lease boundary as per the guidelines of CPCB in order to arrest pollution emanating from mining operations within the lease. The whole Green belt shall be developed within first 5 years starting from windward side of the active mining area. The development of greenbelt shall be governed as per the EC granted by the Ministry irrespective of the stipulation made in approved mine plan.

Total area under greenbelt/plantation up to conceptual stage is 46.0 ha. As on date 16.0898 ha area has been covered under greenbelt plantation. Remaining 30.2952 ha area will be covered under greenbelt/Plantation up to conceptual stage. The company has planted local species for greenbelt development in consultation with forest department.
